<u>Update:</u> With the official end of the Public Health Emergency pertaining to Covid-19 on 5-11-2023, the TCCHD is now restructuring its monthly newsletter to disseminate current content regarding public health issues within Trumbull County and its surrounding areas. The TCCHD monthly newsletter will still continue to report relevant, accurate, and up-to-date data regarding Covid-19 within the county, and the TCCHD's continued and committed efforts to combat the Covid-19 virus.

Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) moving forward in Trumbull County.

Recently, the Trumbull County Combined Health District and Warren City Health District met with many other agencies including Mercy Health, the Healthy Community Partnership, and the Trumbull Mental Health and Recovery Board within Trumbull County to discuss the CHIP and many strategies within it (CHIP) to help improve the lives and health of everyone within Trumbull County.

All the agencies in attendance were able to work together and add the final remaining touches and details needed for the strategies that the communities within Trumbull County said needed addressed in this new CHIP. The three areas of focus in the new CHIP are:

- Mental Health and Substance,
- Access to Care,
- And Community Conditions with an emphasis on Community Safety.

In the upcoming months many of these agencies (the TCCHD included) will begin to roll out many of those actions related to the strategies that they have been working on for the past few months. Covid-19 Data:

For April of 2023: The TCCHD has administered approximately 43,545 doses of the Covid-19 Vaccine. 20,937 are first doses, 17,862 are second doses, 3,426 are monovalent first booster doses, 532 are monovalent second booster doses, and 788 are bivalent boosters (original and Omicron), In May of 2023, the TCCHD gave 49 Bivalent vaccines, As of 6/5/2023, Trumbull County has a case rate

of **22.2** per 100,000. *Positivity Rate is no longer* being quantified by the CDC.

<u>Air Quality Alert Issued for the</u> <u>Mahoning Valley!</u>

Due to the many Canadian Wildfires currently burning out of control, the Mahoning valley is under a Minor air quality advisory day from the US Air Quality Index or AQI. The AQI states that if possible stay indoors and limit being outside as much as possible, and those with respiratory issues such as COPD or emphysema, should take greater caution when venturing outside during this advisory. This advisory is expected to be lifted on 6-9-23.

- ✓ If you work out, please do so early in the morning, and take breaks if it gets too hot,
- ✓ Stay Hydrated,
- Wear loose, lightweight, light colored clothing if possible,
- Wear sunscreen and reapply if need be,
- Spray or mist yourself with cool water,
- \checkmark Put a cold pack or cloth on your neck or armpits,
- Do not leave children in cars,

<u>Pool Safety Tips</u>

As the weather begins to warm up, and many Trumbull County Residents begin to open and use their pools and spas this summer season, the TCCHD would like to pass on some helpful safety tips for enjoying yourselves in and around the water:

- Never leave a child unattended in or near the water,
- Teach children how to swim,
- Teach children how to stay away from drains,
- Ensure your pool has the right drain cover if applicable,
- Install proper barriers, covers, and if possible alarms on and around your polls and spas,
- Know how to perform CPR on children and adults Source: US Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Know the Signs:

Signs and Symptoms of Heat Exhaustion:

- High body temperature,
- High heart rate and low blood pressure,
- Dehydration and electrolyte loss,
- Extreme weakness,
- ✓ Trouble walking,
- Fainting, or light headedness,
- Abdominal cramps, nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea,

Signs and Symptoms of Heat Stroke:

- High body temperature
- ✓ Profuse sweating,
- 🗸 Headache
- Irrational behavior,
- Emotional instability
- ✓ Altered consciousness,
- ✓ Coma, or seizure.

Who is at risk:

Anyone, but those with the following are at a higher risk:

- High body mass index, or obesity
- Old age,
- Poor physical health,
- Sleep deprived

Health conditions that predispose you to dehydration and malnutrition.

Food Safety Tips for Outdoor Events:

As we all begin to have outdoor events with family and friends, the TCCHD would like to remind everyone about some simple outdoor food safety tips to keep everyone healthy and happy this summer:

- Clean food prep surfaces and tools often,
- Wash your hands frequently when preparing and serving food,
- Separate the meat from other ingredients of possible,
- Make sure the food is cooked thoroughly,
- Refrigerate any leftover food promptly,
- Make sure to keep certain foods "Cool for the summer", such as potato and macaroni salad.

<u>PERTUSSIS "WHOOPING COUGH" VACCINATION CLINICS AVAILABLE in TRUMBULL</u> <u>COUNTY</u>

Trumbull County Combined Health District (TCCHD) holds vaccination clinics at the West Farmington Fire Station for childhood vaccines which includes the Pertussis "whooping cough" vaccination. Whooping cough, also known by the technical name Pertussis, is an illness that affects the lungs and is easily spread from person-to-person through coughs and sneezes. A person who contracts whooping cough may be able to spread the illness to other people for up to 21 days, and may not be able to return to work, school, or daycare for the same amount of time.

In addition to flu-like symptoms, whooping cough can cause violent "whoop-like" coughing, difficulty breathing, turning blue, vomiting after coughing, and fatigue. The cough can last for several weeks, even after the person is no longer infectious. Other complications include pneumonia, convulsions, brain disease, and death. **One-third** of babies under the age of one will be hospitalized for whooping cough.

The best way to protect yourself and others from whooping cough is to get a Pertussis vaccination. To be fully protected, a child should receive five doses of the vaccine between the ages of two months to six years of age.

The following schedule of doses is recommended:

- \square Two months
- \square Four months
- □ Six months
- □ 15 through 18 months
- □ Four through six years

Pregnant women should receive a Pertussis vaccine (Tdap) with each pregnancy, during the **third trimester** of pregnancy. This is to protect the newborn until the child reaches 2 months of age and can be vaccinated with the Pertussis vaccine.
